GETTING STARTED

Obtaining plants

Gardeners can obtain plants by buying annually from a nursery or supplier, or by raising their own cuttings. After flowering, plants are cut down to around 30cm to produce 'footstools'.

These are carefully trimmed of basal shoots, planted in a tray of compost and kept dry & frost free over the winter. In early Spring, shoots will appear that may be used as softwood cuttings by rooting in trays or pots of compost. Alternatively, these stools may be re-planted in early to mid-May and four of the basal growths grown on to produce flowers.

When well rooted, pot on singly in an 8cm pot or 12 to a standard seed tray. Plants obtained rooted from a nursery are treated similarly. Plants should be watered sparingly. When plants have filled pots or trays, move on to a 12.5cm pot or 6 to a seed tray. In late Spring, plants should be 'stopped' i.e. growing tip removed to encourage a number of side shoots or stems.



Greenhouse Chrysanthemums

Greenhouse chrysanthemums are grown in containers or pots. Plants produced in 12.5cm pots as above, are potted into a circa 22cm pot of John Innes or soilless compost in late May or early June, well supported & stood outside. From then on, plants will benefit from weekly feeding with a balanced liquid feed of normal strength up until buds show colour. Plants, including Fantasies are generally grown as disbuds, the number of stems is 4-5 for decoration, for larger bloom, 3 per plant, single and anemones 7-8 per plant.

Remove side shoots but keep the central bud - from this stage plants should be kept reasonably moist Buds will begin to show colour in late August to early September and should be placed in a greenhouse or conservatory in mid to late September.

IN THE GARDEN

Garden Chrysanthemum Blooms *(below)*

In early/mid-May, plants from trays or pots may be planted in their flowering positions, either in prepared beds, borders or suitable containers. A top dressing of a general fertiliser is usually given 3-4 weeks before planting. After planting about 40cm apart, plants and then flowering stems are tied to a cane or grown through mesh for support. Where large flowers (disbuds) are wanted, side shoots are removed to allow one central bud per stem. For decoration or cutting, allow 4-5 blooms per plant, or 2-3 for exhibition. Water plants as necessary, especially when flowering.



Garden Sprays *(see front cover)*

Early garden sprays produce vivid splashes of colour from pots or in the ground. They naturally produce a bud in the growing tip too, and shoots form to give a number of flowering stems - often as many as ten blooms per stem. All they require is some support & a little attention with a weekly balanced liquid feed and will reward you with a super display. Expect flowers from August to October.

Hardy Chrysanthemums

These may appear in general plant catalogues as Koreans or Rubellums and may be planted into garden beds or borders where they will flower every year. After flowering, they are cut back and treated as herbaceous perennials. They are perfectly hardy & new shoots will appear in the Spring from which they will flower naturally from early September & as with herbaceous perennials, no disbudding or pinching is needed.

PATIO DISPLAYS

Patio or Cushion Mums

We refer to these as Garden Mums, you may also hear them referred to as Yoder Mums or Charms.



They have been produced for containers or the front of borders where they will produce a long period of autumn colour & replace spent summer bedding.

Usually flowering from early August into December. Highly versatile, they are also used in hanging baskets, window boxes and a wide range of containers.

Cuttings may be taken as late as June and grown 3 in a 3ltr pot or 5 in a 5ltr pot. They will naturally produce a dome shaped plant with flowers completely hiding the foliage.
